He suggested that any failure the club had in drawing, the past few years may have been a failure of the Braves' organization to "properly avail itself to the opportunity."

Fitzgerald also cited the legal contract with Milwaukee County which binds the club to play its National League home games in County Stadium and said any request of the club's executive officers to move would be "asking the directors to approve the intentional breach of contract."

Fitzgerald said the law of contracts "is the very foundation of organized baseball."

"To the best of our knowledge, baseball teams expect compliance from the players. How then can a baseball team intentionally breach a stadium rental contract?" he said.

He said independent legal

He said independent legal counsel contacted by the dissident owners has informed them that the corporation would be exposed "to substantial financial liability and the extremely strong probability that the Braves could be injunctively restrained from playing their 196 home games any place but in Milwaukee County Stadium."

Fitzgerald said the public consequences of an intentional contract breach "would not only tarnish the Bra'es, but all of baseball as well." Joining Fitzgerald in dissent-

## Milwaukee May Be Saddled With \$8½ Million Memory

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Milwaukee's County Stadium is "definitely a white elephant" if major league baseball is not played here next year. William Anderson, stadium manager and county recreation director, said Wednesday.

Anderson, commenting on the Braves' decision to ask the National League for permission to move to Atlanta, Ga., said "the four Green Bay Packer games and one or two special events each year are not enough to make the stadium pay."

The etadium which seats 44.

The stadium, which seats 44,-613 for baseball, was built in 1953 at a cost of about \$6 million. It is worth \$812 million today. Anderson said.

In order to build the structure. Milwaukee County issued some \$4.350.000 in municipal bonds and levied a tax of about \$789.000 on county residents. Anderson's office said the stadium is paid for now.

He said the county had not planned for the future use of the stadium if the Braves decided to move the franchise. "We didn't make any future

"We didn't make any future plans because we thought we were bargaining in good faith with the owners. After all, our contract states the team still must play their home games here in 1965," he said.

The stadium is a major league facility in "every way." he said. It has the capacity to park 12,000 cars and 250 buses in an 84-acre area.

Anderson said the stadium operated in the black every year since the Braves left Boston in 1953. The team, then under the ownership of Boston construction magnate Lou Perini, paid a rent of \$25,000 the first year. The county thereafter got all the revenue from parking and concessions. In 1954, Perini voluntarily paid \$250,000 in rent, but in 1955 a new contract was negotiated and rent was based on attendance.

In 1957, 1958 and 1959 when the Braves were breaking all National League attendance records, the rent was \$136,183; \$191,553, and \$186,073 respective-

Although Anderson said the county could not operate the stadium at a profit if major league baseball left the city, his office said the loss would "not be too great" because of revenue from football and special events.

However, Anderson made it

clear Milwaukee "can support major league basebali" and indicated the city "would try to get another club if the Braves are allowed to leave."

ing in Atlanta . Negroes face

direcrimination already in At-

lanta and it's not going to stop overnight because the Braves move there."

Both Maye and Henry Aaron, the Braves great rightfielder who is also a Negro, had expressed concern about moving to Atlanta ever since it had become quite apparent that the team wanted to go.

"I've got to make a living so

I'll go if the team does." Maye said. "We've got to eat." Maye said. however, he had

no intention of moving his wife and their 11-year-old son to Atlanta. "They're going to stay here. My boy is going to stay in school here."

Aaron's wife. Barbara. said she and Hank had talked about the pending move.

"I don't see any reason to disrupt my household here." said Mrs. Aaron. They live in an expensive ranch bome in the northern suburb of Mequon. "I'm staying," she said. Mrs. Aaron indicated her

husband would make the move if the Braves get approval of other team owners. "But all my friends are here and I've got two children in school here," she said, She indicated Aaron would

have no choice but to make the move, while his family stayed in the North. The wife of Eddie Mathews.


